

Chapter 26

New Zealand



New Zealand is perhaps one of the most geographically isolated countries in the world and has a population of over five million on its two islands. The English began to settle and live in New Zealand alongside the Tangata Whenua (indigenous people). On Christmas day in 1814, Samuel Marsden was invited to preach the gospel by an influential chief named Ruatara from the Ngāpuhi tribe. From that event, a mission station in New Zealand was opened and over the next few decades, a revival spread through the country amongst this nation's indigenous people.

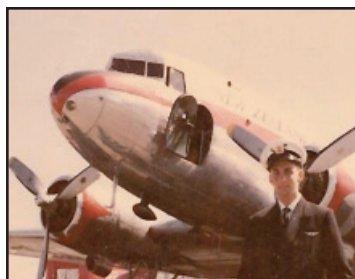
New Zealand was the first overseas branch of Open Air Campaigners. Jim Duffecy and George Bremner conducted ministry here during 1953-54 and founded an OAC branch in Auckland and Wellington in 1954. The work expanded and flourished through effective training. One prime example of this is the Sowers Program, which was developed in the Philippines by New Zealand staff in 1975. In 1988, OAC released this program to a newly formed Sowers International organization which had its headquarters in New Zealand. Sowers International continues to this day with multinational projects being conducted in Australia, Cote d'Ivoire, DR Congo, Ghana, India, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Nepal, and New Zealand.



Through the years, God has used OAC NZ to provide many key people to establish, nurture, and advance the gospel, not only in New Zealand but around the world. Such individuals have included Gerald Bradley, George Bremner, Bryan Fruish, Noel Gibson, David Salisbury, Barry Tetley, and others.

Ken Rout came on staff in 1965 and served until 1977 when he became part of the SOWERS International team. He was promoted to heaven in 2024.

Another key person in OAC from New Zealand is David Wilson. He was born in this country, became an airline captain with Air New Zealand, then felt led to leave for the USA in 1967 to become an international missionary. After graduating from Bible college, he joined the OAC-USA staff in 1970, and subsequently became the director of the Baltimore/DC branch. Moved by the Lord to an expanded international ministry, he formed and became director of the Overseas Ministries department, which is now known as Worldwide Proclamation (WP) and

has been responsible for planting OAC branches in Bolivia, Brazil, Congo (DRC), Ecuador, India, Jamaica, Kenya, Mexico, Paraguay, Peru, Russia, and Ukraine. David also served as our OAC International president from 1996 to 2004 and travels on a regular basis to visit OAC branches in many countries in order to encourage and train our staff.



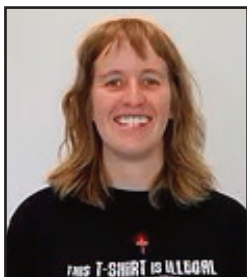

Lew Meyer and his wife, Angela, have been another example of New Zealand staff used by God in the work of OAC in this part of the world. Lew was the national director for a number of years, has a background in science and training at Massey University (BSc) and Biblical Studies (New Zealand Assembly Bible School). He participated in the six-week training seminar taught by Gerald Bradley in 1981, which led to working with OAC in New Zealand for over 35 years.

Through the years, God has blessed, and OAC NZ has expanded to include present-day branches in Auckland, Hawkes Bay, Canterbury, Dunedin, Manawatu, Waikato, and Bay of Plenty. The work in this nation is known as OAC - Outreach and Church Ministries NZ and the national office is located in Hastings. This country has gifted staff who specialize in communicating the gospel of Jesus Christ to people who are normally outside the scope of routine church outreach. It works alongside the local church, leading people to faith in Christ and into fellowship with local churches. OAC in New Zealand is committed to taking the gospel of Jesus Christ into the world of the unconverted and equipping the Christian church to do the same. OAC evangelists around New Zealand are regularly sharing the gospel through open-air programs, personal evangelism, holiday programs, youth events, door-to-door visitation, prison work, retirement homes, universities, and anywhere else they can!

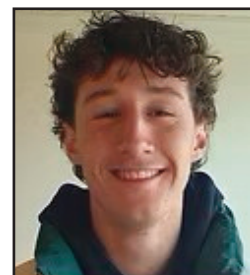

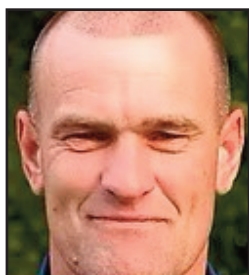

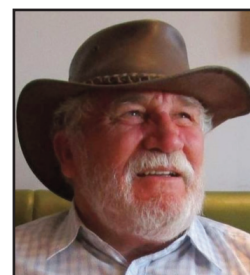
