

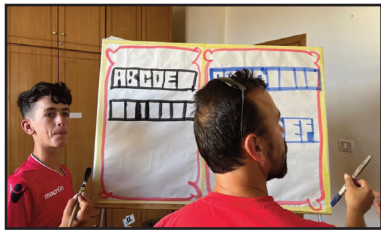
Chapter 3

Albania



Albania was proclaimed independent in November 1912, after almost five centuries of Ottoman rule. After World War II, Albania became a communist state and remained isolationist, during which time it was considered the poorest and most repressive country in all of Europe. Religion was banned, travel was forbidden for its citizens, and ownership of private property was prohibited. Then, with its transition to democracy in the early 1990s, the doors for ministry opened wide, and our OAC staff began walking through!

In 1991, Ian and Caralee Loring were ministering in Greece, taking trips across the border into Albania to minister in the open air. They had previously worked with some Albanians who had escaped from communism into Greece, and found them eager to learn and quickly trusted Christ. These folks also had family connections allowing open doors into Albania. A short-term bus tour was quickly organized, and the Lorings brought with them the few Bible books that had been translated into Albanian. Open-air meetings were held with huge crowds gathering. It was a joy to use the base of Stalin's statue, which had been pulled down, as a pulpit to preach the gospel in Tirana's capital, with hundreds listening. At a meeting held at the stadium in the city of Korca, 2,000



attended. With the help of some friends, The Jesus Film was shown to a packed house in the town movie theater! People were eager to hear what had been forbidden for so long. Reactions of the crowds ranged from welcoming and eager to hostile and threatening, including spitting and rock-throwing. In Erseka, the crowd was particularly hostile as the message about Peter's call was being preached. Two muscular teens, who spoke a little English, intervened and kept the crowd back, allowing the message to finish. Since our staff could speak some English, these boys were thanked, and the gospel was presented to them. Both trusted Christ as their Savior. But there was a problem. Due to many years of religious repression, there were no local churches with which to work or refer people for follow-up and discipleship. Our early OAC workers in this country found themselves in a situation where, even though our primary purpose is evangelism, planting churches was necessary for the work to grow and spiritually flourish. A church has since been planted in Erseka.

In 1999, California resident Bert Youde learned about OAC through his missions pastor at Shadow Mountain Community Church, who promoted building a team to help repair homes in Kosovo amid the country's civil conflict. Bert was asked to assemble a construction team, and by God's grace, ten men spent several weeks rebuilding widows' homes. It was during that trip that he formed a close working relationship with our OAC staff and subsequently took seven evangelism teams to Albania over the following years to work with our staff and the Korca Evangelical Church. It was in 2008 that Bert was asked to consider helping officially establish a branch of Open Air Campaigners in Albania by establishing a US-based non-profit mission agency to facilitate recruitment of workers and resource acquisition. Since that time, God has used OAC staff in other parts of the world for training and outreach in Albania. Mike and Dawn Getley from OAC Great Britain, along with others, have been a great blessing and help through the years. The Lord has also led OAC Albania to establish a girls' safe house and a boys' home to meet the needs of those in this part of the world.

Albano and Fabiola Kadi have three children and, over the last 23 years, have served God in a variety of ways to develop OAC Albania in the Korca area. In the beginning, Albano was involved in youth ministry and evangelism, including working with the church plants of the Korca church. He eventually switched to being the church's finance person, ultimately became a pastor, and is currently the senior pastor of the Korca church. He also leads the church-planting movement in SE Albania, which presently comprises nine local churches.

The following are staff testimonies illustrating how the Lord has worked over the years in some of the newest staff members. What a great blessing it is to note that many of these individuals are products of this OAC ministry and are now ministers!

Paul Alkazraji began his association with OAC in 1997. He was living in the UK and working as a press officer. Paul traveled to Albania in 1998 to write a newspaper report about the work of OAC, which led to a book entitled "Christ and the Kalashnikov" in 2000. Paul met and married his Albanian wife, Albana, and returned to live in the country that same year. They joined the staff of OAC Albania in 2003. He developed and ran a magazine for churches in the southeast of Albania called Ujëvarë' until 2010. In 2012, he began a new role as team leader of a church plant in the village of Vloçisht, where Albana had a ministry among children. Albana now leads the women's ministry there, and Paul is the pastor of Vloçisht church, also supporting a church plant in the nearby village of Bulgarec. Paul is incredibly creative in coming up with new ways to bring people to Christ and leads a team that is reaching out to the surrounding villages. He has written two Christian novels based on his experiences of living in Albania: 'The Silencer' (2012) and 'The Migrant' (2019). They have one son, Hanniel.

Xhoni Bacellari is located in Korca. He is married to Rudina, and they have two boys, Joeli and Daeni. He works in the church, which was established by OAC in 2009. His ministry duties in the office entail handling a wide range of roles and responsibilities. Overseeing the finances for church plants is his

primary responsibility at this time. He also handles legal affairs and works with the government to obtain any permits or licenses OAC needs. In addition, he helps our missionaries with housing and living permit details.

Meet Sokol Bori, from Durrës, who moved with his mother to the village of Sheqeras at a young age. He has been a believer since his teenage years and was baptized at eighteen to show his steadfast commitment to serving God. He has worked for the church since 2016 and, in 2018, came on full-time as a pastor-in-training in Sheqeras after graduating from Bible school. Two favorite things are having fun and sharing the gospel. Sokol is married to Sara Kaimaku; they have served full-time in the church and village since 2021.

Thomas Bourke is the son of American missionary parents working with The Navigators. He spent his early adult life in the U.S. Air Force and chose to transition to full-time ministry in Korca after his wife's trip in 2019. Arianna grew up in the U.S., the daughter of an Albanian and an American. Her first trip to Albania occurred in July 2019 with OAC. The Lord quickly captured her heart for the country, and upon returning, Arianna shared the vision with her husband. With her background in social work/child welfare, and his mechanical and musical experience, it was easy to see how God could use them in Albania. They served faithfully with OAC until June of 2022.



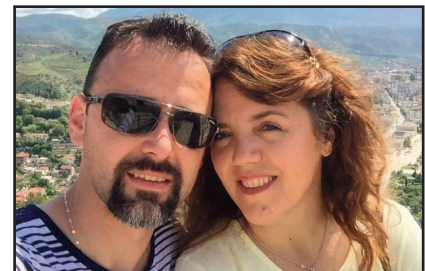

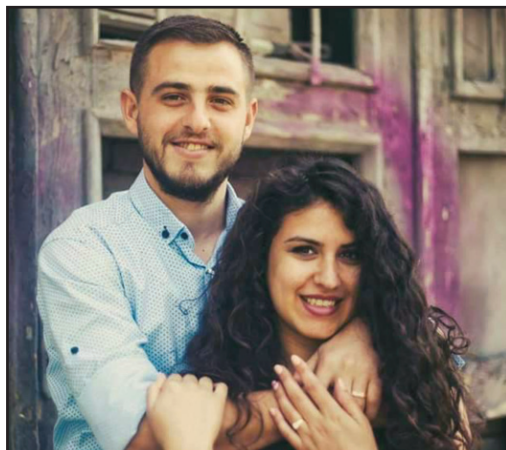
ERION & MELODIE DIELLI

When he became an official staff member with OAC, he began helping with programs in Vloqisht and later in Bulgarec. He also plays guitar in the worship band in Korca on Sundays. Erfiola is from the village of Libonik. When Erfiola first began with OAC, she was working in the Girls' Home, and now she is spearheading the integration of music therapy into our special education care plan.

Eris Duro is also from Korca and has grown up in the church; his grandfather is one of the pastors at The Evangelical Church of Korca. In 2013, he was baptized and began volunteering with the church. He works with youth in general, and specifically with the pre-teen group in Korca called Shqiponja. Eris has created many games for the kids to play and often leads the devotional time. He completed his Master's degree in Agronomy at the University in Korca. During the fall of 2019, he coached a group of boys from Shqiponja in our organization-wide football league.

Ashley Henderson first connected with Open Air Campaigners in July 2018 when she came to Albania on a mission trip with her church. She then entered a one-year internship commitment with OAC Albania in June 2019, when she moved there. She felt God leading to extend her stay, living in Korca, and working with the Kenedi Foundation and The Gospel Church of Korca as the media manager. She has served as the administrator for the Instagram and Facebook pages for Open Air Campaigners Albania and maintained

kenedifoundation.org, which has a history of working closely with OAC. Ashley has also been involved with the junior high ministry at the Gospel Church of Korca. She assisted Flori Adili, the coordinator, with logistics and planning; the Lord led them to marry in April of 2020. They transferred their staff status to OAC Great Britain 2024 and continued to have a thriving ministry in Albania until their field assignment ended in 2025.

Sara Kaimaku is from Metro Detroit, Michigan. Both of her parents are from Korca. While visiting her family's land in 2019, God called her to Himself and to missionary life. She arrived, again, in May to work at the Girls' Home and to do ministry in the village of Sheqeras. That ministry includes meeting with girls (teens and

younger), pre-teens, children, and the whole church.

Xhentil Kora is from the village of Plasa. While attending the church plant programs, he became a believer and immediately began volunteering at the church, eventually becoming a full staff member. He graduated from Bible school in March 2019. Throughout the week, he meets with children, teen boys, and men in the village for Bible studies and fellowship. He also preaches once a month for Plasa's big group meeting. In addition to all of this, he plays the keyboard during worship for these meetings. Xhentil is married to Victoria, and they have one child, Michael.

He began working for The Evangelical Church of Korca around 2009 and Eglia in 2011, after they got married. In 2016, he and Eglia started working at the Pojan church plant and moved to Pojan full-time. They work with their volunteers to put on programs for all ages, provide care to the people of the village, host summer teams to preach in the open air, and conduct VBS programs.

Ryan McDonald is from the San Diego area of California. His sister, Melodie, came to Albania in 2005, so he visited many summers before moving here. Ryan's wife, Kayla, is from Canada and moved to Northern California when she was five. They married in June 2017 and honeymooned in Albania. In 2018, they joined OAC and moved to Pogradec in March. They work with the church plant in Pogradec, where their primary ministry focus is running a coffee shop plus a Bed and Breakfast. Due to the city's high unemployment rate, the church felt a strong need to provide job opportunities for its members and the community. Ryan and Kayla, along with a team of others from the church, oversaw the renovation and design of the new coffee shop and Bed and Breakfast, Garden Villa, on the recently purchased church property in the center of town. They transformed the three-story, hundred-year-old Villa and its large yard with multiple gardens and patios into a beautiful, classic, and vibrant location. Since the coffee shop's grand opening in August 2018, they have employed over 21 people, and the influence this has had on the church and the families of those employed has been incredible to see. The main goals of Garden Villa are Christ, Community, and Church. Through employee training and daily discipling in a Christ-centered work environment, the community is reached, with the ultimate goal of growing the church. The Bed and Breakfast portion of Garden Villa opened in the spring of 2020 as an extension of the same mission, offering more job opportunities and open doors to reach the community while meeting a genuine business need of the city.

Jetnor has two primary roles within the church: a Shqiponja staff member and a worker at the kids' day center. During the summer, he facilitates a football (soccer) program for the boys at the day center. Their team is called Korca United. Currently, he is obtaining a Bible school degree.

Luke and Lydia Valenti have served with Open Air Campaigners Albania church planting in the village of Plasa. Luke was first introduced to the work of OAC and Albania when he went there on a mission trip in college. Touched by the Albanian people's great need to hear the gospel, God captured his heart for missions. Luke later joined OACA in 2009 to pioneer ministries in Albanian villages without churches.



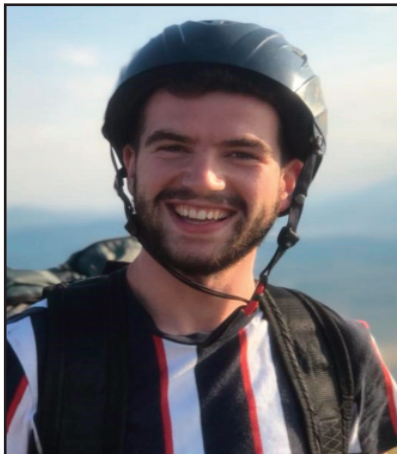

During a summer outreach, God led Luke to the town of Plasa, where some youth responded positively to the gospel. Leading a team of Albanian workers, Luke began working with the children and youth of Plasa, eventually ministering to their families as well. Three years into the work, Luke reconnected with his friend Lydia, who also had a heart for missions. They married and returned to Plasa to continue planting a church in the village and serving the community's needs. Many Albanians believed, and several were baptized, and the Plasa Evangelical Church began services in 2016. Medical issues forced the Valentis to return to the States, and leadership of the Plasa church was transferred to Xhentil Kora and other young adults in the Plasa church. The young Albanian leadership grew significantly and continues to lead the Plasa church to this day. The Valentis continue to encourage and fundraise on behalf of the Plasa church from their home in Oregon.

Mesina Vitollari is working in the Tirana area. She came to faith through outreach conducted around 2014 in her hometown and has been an active volunteer helping in the Pogradec area. She has finished university in Tirana.

He is part of the Shqiponja staff and works each week at three or four meetings with the teens, and develops programs and lessons when they are not meeting.
