## Chapter 35

## Scotland





Rosemary & Roger Gray 1978

Roger Gray was converted in 1971, and a year later, Cliff College conducted a mission at his Methodist church in Bournemouth, which included open-air meetings. This was the first time that seeing the gospel reach the ordinary person on the street made an impression on him. So, soon after, some friends and he started doing Sunday afternoon open-air meetings near the seafront, featuring singing, testimony, and short talks. Encouragingly, conversations followed, showing how people needed a clear gospel presentation. After that, on certain Saturday afternoons, he would give out Christian leaflets downtown. This also often led to further gospel opportunities.

In 1978, Roger started a two-year course at the Bible Training Institute (BTI) in Glasgow (later changed to International Christian College). Happily, the BTI was where Roger met Rosemary, whom he later married! The course was quite a change from his nine years of accountancy in Bournemouth! Regular outreach was part of the curriculum, so he teamed up with another student, Clifford, and with sketchboard, easel, and chalks, they went to Buchanan Street on many Saturday afternoons. Their meetings attracted a good number of listeners, and Roger became aware that God was increasing his interest in open-air evangelism to a burden that had to be continued.

In 1981, shortly after leaving BTI, Roger learned from another student that Open Air Campaigners staff were holding an annual training week in Birmingham, so he attended and saw what a valuable tool the sketchboard was in preaching the gospel! After this, he returned to Glasgow with board and paints, and two weeks later began doing regular "open-airs" with a small team in the city center. They often had crowds averaging 50 people, with many of these spoken to afterward.

In 1983, Roger received a letter from OAC National Director, David Fanstone, inviting him to consider forming a new branch of OAC in Scotland. They prayed over this for a year, and gradually, God confirmed that this was the way forward. In June 1984, Roger left Scripture Union Scotland and started a nine-month training course with OAC, which proved most valuable. The training involved participating in missions in Glasgow, Plymouth, and York, along with visiting other OAC evangelists to gain experience in speaking to different age groups. Several training days for churches emerged from this, together with the start of school assemblies (which grew to over 30 each term over the years)!

In March 1985, OAC Scotland officially launched at Findlay Memorial Church (their home church), with Geoffrey Grogan, BTI principal, as guest speaker. This speaker attracted an excellent variety of Christians from different churches. Although this happened so many years ago, it provided a good foundation which is vital for those called to long-term missionary service.

Rosemary had long experience in children's work and missions in Belfast before meeting Roger in 1978. This was to prove invaluable, both for future OAC children's ministry and increasing involvement with Findlay (where she headed up Discoverers and 625 Club for many years before training up successors).

One lesson they've learned over the years, and are still learning, is that salvation is a work of God. OAC has equipped them with a wide variety of methods and visual aids, which, for many groups, are useful in gaining attention. Praise the Lord for this! Yet over these many years, with increasing ignorance of the gospel and apathy toward spiritual things, they have become more dependent on God than ever before to open blind eyes and save people. So, it's been uplifting to witness people becoming Christians during meetings, although this isn't the norm! Mostly, they hear of changed lives after such gatherings, and sometimes, this is years later. Therefore, they've become utterly convinced that God's Word will not return to Him empty (Isaiah 55:11) and that many people are being saved that they know nothing of now but with whom we will rejoice in heaven!

Through the years, here is how God led...

**Training:** It's been well worthwhile investing time in others, teaching them to share their faith in open-airs, visiting homes, in children's and youth events, and wherever unsaved people are. Many people become Christians through personal witness; therefore, it's been good to encourage Christians over the years to share their testimony, using a basic gospel outline based on suitable literature. Every Christian is called to be a witness – but some are also called to speak "up front"! So, it's rewarding to see these particular believers develop as they do open-air preaching, take school assemblies, and many other meetings where unsaved folk are


present.

**Open-Airs:** With increasing apathy to spiritual matters in the UK, numbers listening to street preaching have reduced considerably since the early 1980s. However, the majority of meetings today still cause some folk to listen, and, surprisingly, often, it's the teens and early twenties who engage in conversation afterward. This is indeed encouraging, as it's this age group that is missing from so many churches. And, crucially, they have real questions that Rosemary & Roger Gray 2019

can be answered if only Christians will meet them where they are, which is outside church walls!

**Schools:** Roger thought very little of this aspect of ministry before joining OAC; his main burden was evangelism and seeking to train others. But when the doors to schools opened, were they to ignore them? During their time in Glasgow, over 50 schools have welcomed them, mainly to take assemblies, but with a few opportunities for religious education classes and Scripture Union groups. Many of these assemblies continued each term for many years. Since moving to Yorkshire, they have access to just over 30 schools, most of which they enter each term, some more regularly. In this environment, someone can faithfully share Bible stories, tell how Jesus changed numerous people's lives, and how He changed their life — in fact, everything short of challenging pupils and staff to trust in Christ! Furthermore, a lovely bonus of ministry in schools is that when you see these pupils in town, you're totally free to share Christ with them, and they will often listen or take literature because they remember you!

In 2009 at the age of 70, Roger and Rosemary retired and moved to East Yorkshire (Bridlington), England. Roger still does open-airs during the summer months in towns nearby. They both contine to be actively involved in their local church. Even though, as of the writing, there are currently no full-time OAC workers in Scotland, open-airs and school assemblies continue regularly in Glasgow with volunteers from different churches, for which they praise God.
